Indicator 1: The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles			
Objective	Key Actions	Allocated funding	Anticipated outcomes
To encourage children to learn outdoors to a greater degree, so benefitting from increased fresh air	Support the provision of an outdoor classroom which will provide shelter for increased outdoor learning on the school field	£3500 (part-funding)	Children will be able to spend more time outdoors and it will encourage the staff to develop more learning outside, therefore increasing the variety of learning, fresh air and activity
To encourage children to be more productively active at playtimes and lunchtimes	Buy-in Skipping4Schools for whole class workshops to promote skipping as a healthy activity for all children (1 day)	£400	Children will be inspired by the activity day and the leader to take part in skipping at school and at home creating a healthier free time activity.
Indicator 2: The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement			
Objective	Key Actions	Allocated funding	Anticipated outcomes
To encourage children and staff to take regular active breaks in learning	Buy in 5-a-day programme or something similar to use across the school. This will provide short physical activity sessions during the day.	£200	Children will be more alert and ready to learn throughout the day, increasing their ability to embed knowledge and skills. It can also provide physical activity indoors during wet playtimes.
